

TIMBER INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

Hon. W. R. Ross,
Minister of Lands, Victoria, B.C.

SIR,—I beg to hand you a report of the Timber Department for the year ending December 31st, 1911.

The past year has been one of prosperity for the lumbermen of British Columbia. The marked steadiness of the lumber market enabled the mills to operate continuously during the entire year, with the exception of those of the Interior, which have been obliged to close down during November and December. This was caused by the dullness of the lumber market on the American side, and the American mills dumping their surplus cut on the markets of the North-west at less than cost.

I believe those conditions have changed, however, and I look for better times for the Interior mills.

One hundred and forty-three hand-logger licences have been issued during the year.

TIMBER EXPORTED.

Forty-seven million feet of timber have been exported to American mills. A change has been made in the system of granting permits for the export of timber cut from Crown grants, and these permits are now returnable to the captain of the patrol launch at the boundary-line, who issues a receipt for same.

We have cleaned up a lot of old outstanding accounts, and hope to have the rest wiped off at an early date.

 REPORT ON FOREST PROTECTION.

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 BY THE SUPERVISORS.

Before the opening of the fire season of 1911, orders were issued by the Minister of Lands to the Divisional Wardens of the Mainland and Vancouver Island to begin the campaign against the dangerous accumulations of slash that are threatening everywhere to convert some of our forest districts into an almost continuous expanse of fire-traps. During April these Wardens conducted a series of slash-burnings at chosen dangerous places, partly in order to save the expense of patrolling these places during the summer, but chiefly in order to demonstrate by object-lessons that the burning of slash can be carried out, both safely and at moderate cost, in many sections of the Province. The experiments proved extremely successful, many private owners of timber being induced by our Divisional Wardens to clean up old slashings that were exposed to the risk of fire. Attention should be drawn, in this connection, to the agitation against the neglect of the slashing evil in many of the States of the Union that has resulted in some vigorous legislation already, and that is gradually convincing the operators that in dangerous places it is better to burn slash under proper control than to let it take fire at the wrong time by accident.

For the close season of the year the fire-preventive staff of the previous summer was almost doubled in numbers and reorganized. The Province was divided into two—a Supervisor and an Assistant Supervisor being placed in charge of the Upper Country, and the other Supervisor controlling the Coast districts and Northern British Columbia. These two sections were subdivided into ten divisions, each in charge of an Inspector (or Divisional Warden), with headquarters at Victoria, Vancouver, Vernon, Revelstoke, Fernie, Cranbrook, Nelson, Grand Forks, Kitsoas, and Barkerville. A network of patrol was maintained by the appointment of 110 District Wardens acting under the divisional men. Six launches patrolled the timbered water-front of the islands and inlets between Vancouver and Victoria and Alert Bay.

Though weather conditions were favourable, the closeness of the new patrols had a powerful effect in reducing the damage from forest fires, since all but a few of them were ripped in the bud by the prompt arrival of a Local Warden. The statistics of the season's fires are given below.

Apart from many matters now dealt with by the Forest Bill, the chief needs of the Province in the matter of fire-prevention are permanent improvements. The wandering patrolman, who is sometimes hard to find when wanted in an emergency, has had his efficiency vastly increased in many sections of the West by the establishment of field-telephone systems to which he may connect his portable line and instrument; by the cutting-out of fire lines and trails; by signal systems worked from look-out stations placed in commanding situations, and in many other ways. Money must be expended upon such up-to-date improvements if fire-control is to be assured in British Columbia.
